



¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria.

³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.









Christmas Chrismons

First developed many years ago by the women's group of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, these ornaments have been displayed during Advent and the Christmas season in homes and churches throughout our country and the world.

The word "Chrismon" is taken from the two words Christ and monogram, which refers to the Christian symbols depicting various concepts or life-moments of Jesus Christ.

Gracing our Christmas trees in the sanctuary are over 60 of these ornaments which remind us of God's gift of His Son to us.

Let Us Rejoice And Be Glad!

Each Concept & Meaning:

Candle: The candle reminds us to let our own faith in Christ always burn brightly; Christ leads us with His Holy light.

Butterfly: This symbol of life is used to indicate the eternal life we will enjoy because of the love of our Lord.

Star: The bright star in the East was what led the wisemen to the Christ Child, born in a lowly manger in a stable.

Chalice & Bread: We take communion knowing that we are being gifted with the blood and the body of our Savior, who has offered His very life for ours.

Angel: An Angel gave Mary the knowledge of the child of God within her, and angels of the Host of God sang in the sky to herald the coming of this babe.

Lutheran Rose: This particular symbol Martin Luther created, demonstrates his faith and understanding of God's personal relationship with us.

Cross: Though sinless and free of wrong doing, Jesus was crucified on the cross, suffering untold pain and misery, all to take away our sin forever.

Crown: Jesus was born in a lowly state, but after his suffering and death, He rose from the dead to be the King of kings. His cross exchanged for a crown!

Bell: Church bells signify the time for worshippers to gather for church services.

Heart: The heart is a symbol of love and reminds us that God is Love.

Dove: The dove is a symbol of peace and the Holy Spirit.

Triune God: These entwined circles represent the Trinity with the Three eternal and unified members, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
